

2005 in Review

The year 2005 was IPPL's 32nd year of working to make the world a safer place for our primate cousins wherever they live—in the wild or in captivity. Here are some of the highlights of IPPL's Year 2005 work.

Activities Abroad

In April 2005 a woman from Saudi Arabia informed IPPL that a baby orangutan was being offered at the Exotique Pets shop in Riyadh and sent us photographs of the baby. Our members' protests to Saudi officials led to the confiscation of the animal.

In 2005 the nation of Nigeria was placed under a trade embargo by the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species. For many years IPPL had protested the smuggling of animals from other African nations through Nigeria. One example was the smuggling of four young gorillas from their birthplace in Cameroon via Nigeria to Taiping Zoo, Malaysia in 2002. After IPPL's protests, the animals were confiscated and sent to Pretoria Zoo in South Africa, which raised a storm of protest since Limbe Wildlife Centre in Cameroon had offered them a home.

Following an investigation of substandard zoos in Australia by our colleagues at Primates for Primates, and IPPL's follow-up letter-writing campaign, several Australian states are considering strengthening codes for care of zoo animals.

IPPL Secretary Dianne Taylor-Snow photographed the performing

orangutans at the A'famosa Safari Park in Malaysia. The animals were dressed in human clothing and had been trained to ride motor bikes and play golf. IPPL members deluged Malaysian government agencies and embassies with protest letters.

In 2005 IPPL worked with the South African group CARE to have baboons removed from the list of animals considered "vermin" after several released baboons were poisoned in the Vredefort Dome, a region under consideration for World Heritage Site status.

Activities at HQ

IPPL was able to acquire five acres of land adjacent to IPPL Headquarters. The existing buildings on the land will be used for additional office space and storage. New gibbon enclosures are being built on the land to replace older units.

Three issues of *IPPL News* were published. The December issue contained many tributes to the late Dian Fossey, who was murdered in December 1985. Since her death Dian's reputation has been hurt by slander campaigns. The tributes in IPPL's newsletter showed that Dian was a courageous person without whom there might well be no mountain gorillas left today.

Cooperation with Other Primate Groups

In 2005 IPPL received the second installment of our combined ape sanctuary support grant from the

Arcus Foundation. Three of these sanctuaries (Lola ya Bonobo, Tacugama, and HELP Congo) are in Africa and three others (Kalawein, Highland Farm, and the Endangered Primate Rescue Center) are in Asia.

IPPL also held a special fund-raising campaign for the Highland Farm Gibbon Sanctuary, which has been struggling since its founder and entire animal care staff were murdered in 2002. We raised over \$30,000 for animal housing and care, and many new gibbon enclosures are being constructed.

IPPL has continued to support Nature's Beckon in Assam, India, a dynamic group that has been working for many years to promote grassroots conservation through education and to have new areas declared nature reserves.

IPPL also assisted Education for Nature, a Vietnamese NGO, with the costs of producing pamphlets about Vietnam's primates.

In addition, we helped the Last Great Ape Organization, a Cameroon-based group that is working for the enforcement of Cameroon's wildlife protection laws and confiscation of illegally held animals. Several animal traffickers have been incarcerated, a "first" for Cameroon.

The combined strength of donations from you, our members and supporters, as well as your participation in our action campaigns, is making a difference in the lives of many primates around the world. We greatly appreciate the help of all of you!




